Bobby Smith-Bobby had been a Louisiana State Trooper on March 14, 1986 when he was shot in the face by a violent drug offender. Bobby has been blind since the incident. Bobby has since completed his doctorate degree, written two books, and given training and motivational speeches to over one million people. Bobby will give a seminar on critical incident issues and how trauma affects the individual mentally, physically, emotionally, and behaviorally. Kitara McClure- Kitara is originally from the inner city of Chicago. Faced with life in the inner city Kitara was forced to join a gang and was stabbed and beaten when she left. Kitara became a single mother at the age of 16 and sought a better life for her and her son. Kitara joined the military and earned the rank of sergeant. Kitara is currently the Spokane Community College's Multicultural Director and founder of Pony Tales Youth Services, a nonprofit for inner city youth. Kitara speaks on her experiences within a gang and ways to help youth avoid the gang lifestyle.
